Grounding

MARNING

• This machine must be grounded while in use to protect the operator from electrical shock. This unit is equipped with an electrical cord that has an equipment grounding conductor and a

grounding plug. The plug MUST be plugged into a matching receptacle that is properly installed and grounded in accordance with ALL local codes and ordinances.


- DO NOT MODIFY THE PROVIDED PLUG. If it will not fit the receptacle, have the proper receptacle installed by a qualified electrician.
- CHECK with a qualified electrician or service person if you do not completely understand the grounding instructions, or if you are not sure the tool is properly grounded.

Grounded Tools: Tools with 3-Prong Plugs

Tools marked with **Grounding Required** have a 3-wire cord and 3-prong grounding plug. The plug must be connected to a properly grounded outlet. If the tool should electrically malfunction or break down, grounding provides a low resistance path to carry electricity away from the user, reducing the risk of electric shock. (See Figure A.)

The grounding prong in the plug is connected through the green wire inside the cord to the grounding system in the tool. The green wire in the cord must be the only wire connected to the tool's grounding system and must never be attached to an electrically live terminal.

Your tool must be plugged into an appropriate outlet, properly installed and grounded in accordance with all codes and ordinances. The plug and outlet should look like those in the following illustration.



Double Insulated Tools: Tools with Two-Prong Plugs

Tools marked **Double Insulated** do not require grounding. They have a special double insulation system which satisfies OSHA requirements and complies with the applicable standards of Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., the Canadian Standard Association, and the National Electrical Code. (See Figure B.)

Double insulated tools may be used in either of the 120 volt outlets shown in the following illustration.



Extension Cords


AWARNING

- USE A PROPER EXTENSION CORD. Make sure your extension cord is in good condition. When
 using an extension cord, be sure to use one heavy enough to carry the current your product will
 draw. An undersized cord will cause a drop in line voltage, resulting in loss of power and cause
 overheating.
- Be sure your extension cord is properly wired and in good condition. Always replace a damaged extension cord or have it repaired by a qualified person before using it. Protect your extension cords from sharp objects, excessive heat and damp or wet areas.
- Grounded tools require a 3-wire extension cord. Double Insulated tools can use either a 2- or 3wire extension cord.
- As the distance from the supply outlet increases, you must use a heavier gauge extension cord.
 Using extension cords with inadequately sized wire causes a serious drop in voltage, resulting in loss of power and possible tool damage.
- The smaller the wire's gauge number, the greater the capacity of the cord. For example, a 14-gauge cord can carry a higher current than a 16-gauge cord. Minimum extension cord wire size is shown in the following table:

- When using more than one extension cord to make up the total length, make sure each cord contains at least the minimum wire size required.
- If you are using one extension cord for more than one tool, add the nameplate amperes and use the sum to determine the required minimum cord size.
- If you are using an extension cord outdoors, make sure it is marked with the suffix **W-A** (**W** in Canada) to indicate it is acceptable for outdoor use.
- Make sure your extension cord is properly wired and in good electrical condition. Always replace a damaged extension cord or have it repaired by a qualified electrician before using it.
- Protect your extension cords from sharp objects, excessive heat, and damp or wet areas.

Main Parts of Breaker Hammer Kit with Cart





Assembly Instructions


MARNING

- Unplug the demolition hammer.
- Always wear gloves when changing accessories. Skin may become exposed to extreme heat during operation.
- If the chisel doesn't slide in easily, apply grease to the loading end of it.

Assembling the Bit without a Shoulder (with groove)



- 1. Extend lock part 2 to a 150° position and insert bit 1 into holder 3.
- 2. Extend lock part 2 by it pulling back. Pull bit 1 to be sure it is locked.




Assembling a Bit with a Shoulder

- 1. Extend lock part 2 to a 210° position. Insert bit 1 into holder 3.
- 2. Extend lock part 2 to a 180° position and lock the bit.


Note: The shoulder position should be between lock part 2 and holder 3.

3. Extend lock part 2 and pull bit 1 to ensure that it was locked.




Assembling the Cart


1. Slide the wheel (11) on to the bottom support (4).



2. Insert the main poles (2) into the connecting bar (5) and add the plastic feet (6).



3. Slide the hand holder (1) to the main poles (2) and attach the side poles (3) to the clamp piece (16).



Before Each Use

MARNING

- Be sure the bit is secured in place before operation.
- When drilling or screwing into walls, ceilings, etc., make sure beforehand that you will not damage
 any hidden electric cables. During this work you should not touch any metal parts of the machine;
 only touch the machine by the plastic housing.
- Be sure no one is below you when using the hammer in high locations.
- Always remove the plug from the power source before installing or removing a bit or accessory from the chuck.

Operating Instructions

MWARNING

- To reduce the risk of injury, always wear eye protection
- Wear ear protection when using the hammer. Exposure to noise can cause hearing loss.
- Wear heavy duty anti-vibration gloves.
- Be sure the bit is secured in place before operation.
- Hold power tools by insulated gripping surfaces, when performing an operation where the cutting tool may contact hidden wiring or its own cord.
- Always be sure you have a firm footing.
- Hold the hammer firmly with both hands.

- Do not point the hammer at anyone in the area when operating. The bit could fly out and seriously injure someone.
- Burn hazard. Do not touch the bit or parts close to the bit immediately after operation; they will be extremely hot.
- Use only well-sharpened bits that are in good condition and appropriate to task.
- To prevent the bit from jamming, keep the motor running when pulling the bit out of a completed hole.

Switch Operation

- To turn the switch ON, press the 1 button.
- To turn the switch OFF, release the 2 button.



Note: Sometimes the demolition hammer does not begin striking even when the motor is running because the oil inside has becomes too thick. If the demolition hammer is used at a low temperature, or it is used after a long idle time, it needs to run for a little over 5 minutes to warm up.

Grease and Oil Filling

1. Using a 12mm Hex head wrench (NOT included), loosen the 4 screws between the aluminum head and the gear box.



2. Disassemble the aluminum head, cylinder, and piston.




3. Clean the inside of aluminum head. It must be free of metal chips and granular dust. Also, clean the piston and the cylinder.

Note on Cleaning: Clean both the inside and outside of the cylinder, especially the inside. It must be free of metal chips and granular dust. If necessary, use gasoline to clean. Clean the surface of the piston. If necessary, disassemble the O-ring and clean the piston with gasoline. At the same time, check the condition of the O-ring. If the outside diameter is less than the piston, replace the O-ring (#56) to ensure proper performance.



4. Using the oil bottle (#108), fill the aluminum head with grease. Make sure the aluminum head inside is clean before filling.



Note: There are 4 grooves in the aluminum head. Fill all 4 grooves with .53 oz. of grease, for a total of 2.12 oz. of grease.

5. Fill the cylinder with 0.42 oz. of grease. Be sure they cylinder is clean before filling.



6. Reassembly

- a) Assemble the piston into the cylinder. Make sure the O-ring has been included.
- b) Assemble the cylinder into the aluminum head.

- c) Tighten the 4 inner Hex head screws being careful not to forget the spring washer. If tightening the screws with an electric or pneumatic driver, check the torque of the screw with a 12mm wrench (not included) to make sure it's tightened properly.
- d) If necessary, put glue on the screw and screw it in.



After Each Use

MARNING

- Do not remove the chisel until it has cooled.
- Store the tool in dry and clean place.
- · Keep away from children.

Maintenance

MARNING

- Do not use solvents to clean the hammer.
- Carbon brushes are consumable parts. When they become worn they can cause problems with the motor. Use an auto-stop carbon brush which will stop automatically when the carbon brush is worn, then replace the brushes.
- If the supply cord of this power tool is damaged, it must be replaced and only by a qualified service technician.

Maintain the demolition hammer by adopting a program of conscientious repair and maintenance in accordance with the following recommended procedures. It is recommended that the general condition of any tool be examined before it is used. Keep your tool in good repair Keep handles dry, clean, and free from oil and grease. The following chart is based on a normal operation schedule.


Maintenance Interval	Maintenance Point
Daily before operating	Keep the vents clear of dust and debris. Inspect the cord and have it replaced by an authorized technician.
After the 60 hours of use	Check the brushes and replace as needed. If you replace the brushes, run the hammer without load for 15 minutes to seat the brushes properly.

Troubleshooting

Use the table below to troubleshoot problems before contacting service personnel or your local dealer. If the problem continues after troubleshooting, call your local dealer for assistance.

Failure	Possible Cause	Corrective Action
	There has been a power supply interruption.	Check the power supply or use another.
Hammer will not start.	Cable or plug is out of order.	Have an electrician check the cable or replace it if necessary.
	Carbon brush is worn out.	Take the hammer to the service department to change the carbon brush.
Not enough	The hammer needs to warm up.	Allow the hammer to warm up.
impact.	The grease is worn out.	Add the grease.
Not enough power.	The hammer does not function correctly.	Adjust the speed control to correct position.

Hammer Parts Diagram




